From the Pastor's Desk

"If you can't convince them, confuse them." – Harry S. Truman

There are some who would say that the quote above is the motto of whichever political party they are not a part of. And indeed, there are some who would say this is the motto of the church! Communications is a key element of so much of what we do in the church, and we want to do it well because we have some great news for people, and we also have some great opportunities for folks to make this world a better place, if only they would hear/read/see what we are trying to communicate.

We are constantly wondering how to get our messages across, both internally and externally, and it seems like about the only way we think to reach people better is to say it a few more ways: bulletin announcements and newsletters and websites and Facebook and Twitter and bulletin boards and announcements time in our worship services (and sometimes repeats at the end, too) and email blasts and ...But are we really being effective with all these efforts?

We (me and a few key folks) have begun doing some intensive research (including working with a marketing consultant) on how to communicate our messages more effectively. One book I've been reading ("Less Chaos, Less Noise") mentions a reality I think we would all agree on: we are all bombarded with messages, each day, and we cannot possibly take in everything offered us. In this cacophony of messaging, how can Plymouth get its good news to actually lead to more informed and more involved God-lovers and Jesus-followers? Not by saying more, but by communicating more effectively, and focusing on value-driven communications (i.e., answering the question "why should I care"). If we can get our point across in fewer words, more easily noticed, more eye-catching, and only offering that which is of value, then maybe we will have fewer people saying, "I didn't hear about this event" or "I want to help, but don't know how".

The most important and effective communications tool Plymouth has is you – what you do and say – you are our true "business card" to the world!

To this end, we will be incorporating, over time, some of the recommendations of these marketing-effectively consultants (note the change to this newsletter: a summary of events and ways to help on the front page, right at the beginning where you can't miss it; if you only have time for one page, that's the one to look at). We know your time is valuable, but we also know you are important to the life and ministry of this congregation, so we want you to be informed without being overloaded.

We can't do this alone – we need your help. One way you can get involved right now is a little scary to me, but I'm going to try it anyway: a suggestion box! Editorial comments about the bulletins or newsletters – let me know. What do you think about the bulletin boards in Fellowship Hall – valuable information, or total waste of space? Let me know. Wish we used Instagram or an internal message board – let me know. You are the ones who know Plymouth, but you also know the people we are trying to reach, people we would love to welcome into the life of our congregation, so that all can be blessed. Help us spread the word.

Doctrine of Discovery Discussion October 14th

One thing we can say for certain about humanity: it has used questionable rationales for horrendous policies and actions over the course of history. One such rationale is the Doctrine of Discovery, used, among other things, to take lands from Native Americans, kill them, and segregate them onto reservations on marginal lands, leading to generations of poverty and despair. The Church is complicit in this, as we will discuss on October 14th after worship as we explore the Doctrine of Discovery, especially in light of what we are called to do about this historical document today. The Wisconsin Conference UCC is in the learning process on this issue, as UCC churches across the state dedicate time to its study; if enough churches study the issue, a resolution on repudiating this racist Doctrine will be voted on at our Conference Annual meeting in April 2019.

A booklet and copy of the resolution before the Conference will be available on October 7th, or by request (hardcopy or electronically) from Pastor Leslie.

Plymouth's Passport Fair a success!

On September 26th, volunteers Kat Klafka, Ann Lacy, Carol Martell, Leslie Schenk, Laura Stalder (and sister Vicki), and Rain Zephyr worked alongside Spanish-speaking volunteers to host a passport fair at Centro Hispano so that immigrant parents who might at some point be faced with possible deportation, would be able to secure a passport (legal documentation) for their children who had been born in the United States. Plymouth was able to pay for all passport fees because of the generous contributions that our members (including our children!) made, along with money from our EHC Immigration Group grant.

The Passport office had given us 18 appointment slots to fill, and that's the number of successful passport applications we were able to process, giving some peace of mind to families who had lived in fear that their children might not have guaranteed safety otherwise. Many parents went out of their way to extend their gratitude for Plymouth hosting the fair and absorbing the costs. Several were quite emotional as they described how much it meant to them to have the passport for the child. One mother, while crying, said that she would forever remember our church's kindness, and she extended blessings to everyone at Plymouth.

Throughout the day, several of the directors of various programs at Centro Hispano stopped by to learn more about Plymouth and to show appreciation for our work. The new Madison Voces de la Frontera community organizer was especially interested in Plymouth's involvement in immigration justice. So, not only were we able to support individual families at this fair, but we were also able to increase awareness of Plymouth's commitment to immigration justice work and to "Lead the community to be immigrant-welcoming", one of the goals of Plymouth's strategic focus on immigration. This collaborative effort between Plymouth Church and Fabiola Hamdan, Dane County Immigration Specialist, was indeed a success, and hopefully is the first of several more!

Mayer visit

Want to learn more about how the church is ministering to those in need at the border, and what we can do to help? Plymouth is co-sponsoring, with Lake Edge UCC, a visit to the Madison area by Rev. Randy Mayer on November 2-4. Rev. Mayer is pastor of Good Shepherd UCC in Sahuarita, AZ, which is the location of our border mission trip in January (see related article below) and also the church whose "Samaritan" ministry helps sponsor the El Comedor pantry/food kitchen in Nogales, Mexico, helping migrants deported from the US (which we helped with a clothing and essentials drive this spring).

The events are:

- Public talk on Saturday Nov. 3 at 3:00 pm at Plymouth.
- Preaching on Sunday Nov. 4 at 10:00 am at a joint worship service at Lake Edge UCC. Note: there will not be a worship service at Plymouth that day, so we can join with our friends at Lake Edge to worship together and hear Rev. Mayer preach.

All are welcome: invite your neighbors and friends. We will have flyers to help spread the news available in early October.

Border Mission Trip

Want to experience the dangerous, life-threatening journey migrants take across our border, and learn more about why they are willing to risk their lives? Want to meet with UCC friends who are "being the church" on the border, and living out the call to immigration justice in a number of life-affirming ways? Want to meet with UCC friends from other churches across the country to share ways in which we are all "being the church" when it comes to our immigrant neighbors? Join our mission group on a journey of a lifetime to Sahuarita AZ, January 16-20, 2019. We will participate in the Common Ground Border Fair, with optional trips out to the desert to learn about water drops or to El Comedor in Nogales, a mission of food and basic goods for those deported to Mexico. Tour Spanish-style missions, and experience great music and art and wonderful local cuisine. Most of all, be transformed, mind and heart and spirit, by the stories of those living "on the border." A grant from Church Council helps defray some costs, and additional grants are available from the Discipleship Team and Immigration Group. See the enclosed information sheet for further details or contact Pastor Leslie or Jon Schultz for more information. **Note: we need to know who is interested in participating in this mission trip by October 15th, in order to make travel arrangements.**

Mission Trip: Common Ground on the Border (Arizona)

- Why:
 - Plymouth's strategic focus adopted in 2017 on immigration justice; identification during Stewardship campaign in 2016 of desire for adult mission trips
 - biblical imperative
 - curiosity; education to counter "fake news"
 - advocacy
 - help by listening to the stories of those struggling/suffering
 - resistance to inhumane/immoral policies
 - life transforming
- Who: up to 8 Plymouth folks; those interested in learning more about issues of immigration justice and how the church is responding at the border and getting more involved in immigration-related work, including sharing their trip experience with Plymouth after the trip
- What: attend the Common Ground on the Border Fair, various side trips, worship with the Good Shepherd UCC on Sunday morning; share with Plymouth (and beyond?) about your experience, and get more involved in immigration justice work
 - 2018 Common Ground on the Border Fair schedule:
 - Thursday am: Borders Issues class
 - Thursday pm: classes (immigration issues, arts, music)
 - Thursday night: concert
 - Friday am: field trips (El Comedor or local mission church; arts)

 - Saturday am: field trips (desert memorials or water drops or local mission church; arts)

- When: January 16-20, 2019
 - Wednesday, 1/16: travel to AZ (fly into Tucson);
 - Thursday-Saturday, 1/17-19: Border Fair and side trips;
 - Sunday, 1/20 am: worship with the Good Shepherd UCC;
 - Sunday, 1/20 pm: travel home
 - Pre-trip: informational and planning session(s) TBD
 - Post-trip: debriefing; sharing with Plymouth (and beyond) TBD
- Where: Sahuarita AZ, with side trips in the area; passport needed if taking (optional) side trips to Mexico
- How/costs/financial assistance:
 - Travel: airfare (~\$400-600) + shared cost of rental vehicle (~\$50 each)
 - Accommodations: in people's homes (members of Good Shepherd) for free (gift for host suggested); alternatively, folks can stay in hotels for extra \$

- Meals: Friday and Saturday dinners included in Fair registration; Thursday lunch & dinner, Friday & Saturday lunches on own; breakfast likely provided by hosts;
 - Border Fair registration: around \$115 (2018 rate; including Common Ground classes, Border Issues Fair, two concerts and two dinners, as well as Friday morning field trip)
 - Optional: passport application and photo (needed if take trip to El Comedor or want to cross the border on own); personal donation; souvenirs
 - \$200 scholarship for each participant from Church Council
 - Additional grants available upon request from Plymouth's Immigration Group
 - Each participant will be provided with a blank book to take notes and journal in
- Other info:
 - Schedule, brochures, and registration materials for Common Ground on the Border 2019 will be available sometime this fall
 - Deadline for securing spot on trip: October 15th (although sooner is better, if we want to secure flights at decent price)
 - Safety: Good Shepherd folks are seasoned pros at hosting visiting groups, and will guide us on dos/don'ts. Immigration justice is a political issue, and so there is a slight chance that we could be questioned or stopped during desert tours or even at the fair.
 - Accessibility: The Fair is accessible; the desert tours will involve unpaved paths.
 - Processing the experience: we will plan time for our group to meet together during the trip and post-trip to share insights and reflect on our experiences.
 - What can I expect to get out of the experience: this depends in part on you, but likely you will gain insights into border issues, both from the perspective of migrants as well as people living in the area, learn what the church on the border is doing, get fired up about wanting to do more to help migrants with direct aid and advocacy, have visions of what Plymouth could do to "be the church" even more than it is currently doing, and hopefully experience God's Spirit at work "on the border" and in your life.

Neighbors in Need Special Offering

They were at Charlottesville last year, standing up for unity and against racists. They have been going door-to-door in Congress, advocating for health care for the vulnerable and a living wage for all. They have been on the border in AZ witnessing to the despair of families separated and unaccounted for children. They are the folks from the national UCC's ministries of justice and witness, shining a light on acts of injustice and sharing our vision of a better world for all. Their work is supported in part by the Neighbors in Need (NIN) Special Offering, which we will be offering throughout October and dedicating during our service on October 7. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through ucc.org/justice, JWM offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. JWM works with the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates) on policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting

rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice, combating lobbying efforts that work to decrease people's rights.

One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickare, and Hockak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribe UCC congregation in Minneapolis, supported in part by CAIM.

Along with UCC congregations across the nation, Plymouth will receive our **NIN offering on Sunday, October 7th** as part of our World Communion Sunday observance, as we celebrate our connection through God's grace made known in bread and cup with Christians around the globe. There are special gift envelopes at the information table in our gathering space for your use or you may simply note "NIN" in the memo line of your check and drop it in the offering plate or mail it into the Church Office.
